



RECOMMENDATIONS: COUNTING PATIENTS SERVED AT A HEALTH CENTER LOCATED IN OR IMMEDIATELY ACCESSIBLE TO A PUBLIC HOUSING SITE ON THE 2016 UNIFORM DATA SYSTEM (UDS) REPORT

A. Background:

Starting with the 2014 Uniform Data System (UDS), the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) requires **ALL** Health Center Program Grantee and Look-Alike health centers, regardless of targeted special population-based funding, to report on the total number of patients known to reside in public housing or accessible to public housing in line 26 of UDS Table 4 (Selected Patient Characteristics).

B. 2016 UDS instruction text for reporting public housing patients:

Total Patients Served at a Health Center Located In or Immediately Accessible to a Public Housing Site, Line 26

All health centers are to report all patients seen at a site that is located in or immediately accessible to public housing, regardless of whether or not the patients are residents of public housing or the health center receives funding under section 330(i) - Public Housing Primary Care (PHPC). Patients should be counted on this line if they are served at health center sites that meet the statutory definition of PHPC (located in or immediately accessible to public housing) regardless of whether the health center site receives PHPC funding and regardless of whether or not the patient actually lives in public housing (location-based reporting). Public housing means agency-developed, owned, or assisted low-income housing, including mixed finance projects, but excludes housing units with no public housing agency support other than section 8 housing vouchers. C. Strategies to conducting a “Location-Based approach” to counting Public Housing residents:

1. <u>Ask the following questions for each health center site separately:</u>	2. <u>Advantages:</u>	3. <u>Challenges/considerations:</u>
<p>a. Is the health center site located in public housing?</p> <p>b. Is the health center site accessible to public housing? Note: determining whether a health center site is accessible to public housing is at the discretion of the health center’s administration.</p> <p>c. If yes, count ALL patients at this health center site as public housing patients. Note: Each health center must clearly define “accessible to” and be able to support the definition with data. Please make note of this logic in the comments section of UDS report.</p> <p>d. If no, count NO patients at this health center site as public housing patients.</p> <p>e. Aggregate number of public housing residents at all health center sites and report that number on line 26 of Table 4 in the UDS report.</p>	<p>a. “Location-Based” data offers an account of the local area; social determinants of health could be extrapolated.</p> <p>b. Embraces patients who formerly lived in public housing and who have continued to utilize this health center site for services.</p> <p>c. Streamlines workflow; lessens reporting burden.</p> <p>d. Maximizes patient care; minimizes intake processing.</p>	<p>a. High degree of variability in definition of patients living “accessible to” public housing.</p> <p>b. The number reported does not exclusively reflect patients living in public housing.</p>

D. Recommendations:

Community Health Partners for Sustainability encourages health centers to determine whether your health center site/s is located in public housing or accessible to public housing. **If yes, report all patients on line 26 of the UDS report.** If not, report no patients on line 26.
